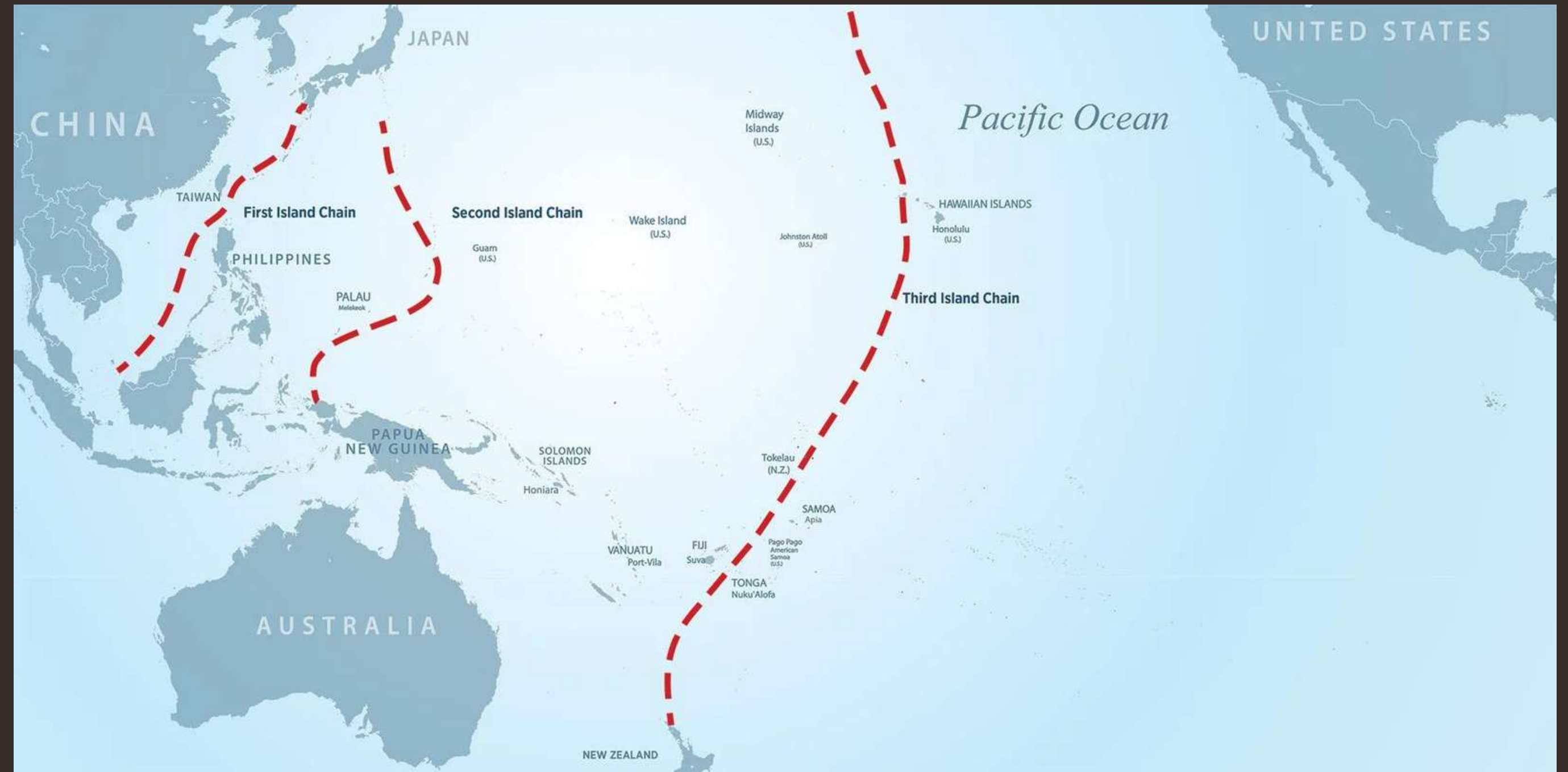
IMPERIALISM

Imperialism is the highest stage of capitalism. It is one of the three basic problems facing the Philippines.

- While early capitalism saw free trade and competition, capital in imperialism is concentrated in fewer and fewer hands (e.g. Disney, Amazon, Nestle).
- These companies then become monopolies who control everything in specific sectors and are protected and supported by the state.
- These monopolies then take their business internationally and exploit people all over the world.

In the Philippines, we see imperialist ownership of key industries like oil, banking, and mining. Imperialism also brings with it cultural and political changes, for example:

- the Visiting Forces Agreement
- the centering of US culture - English is the official language alongside Tagalog!

CASE STUDY: WOGGLE



Steven Smith – Non-Executive Chairman

Steven joined the Board in September 2021 and was appointed Chairman on 21 March 2025. He is currently a director of Candy Ventures S.À.R.L, a Luxembourg based Venture Capital business, funded by British entrepreneur Nick Candy. Steven qualified as a Chartered Accountant at BDO and subsequently as a Chartered Tax Adviser whilst at KPMG. He lectured in Taxation at FTC for four years and then held a number of senior financial positions at large Public and Private Groups culminating in him being appointed as CFO of a FTSE 250 company. Steven now holds a range of Non-Executive roles at companies including Audioboom Group plc, an AIM quoted media business. Mr Smith is MTL Lux's appointee to the Board, and as such is not considered to be independent.



WOGGLE IN THE PHILIPPINES: A BRIEF TIMELINE

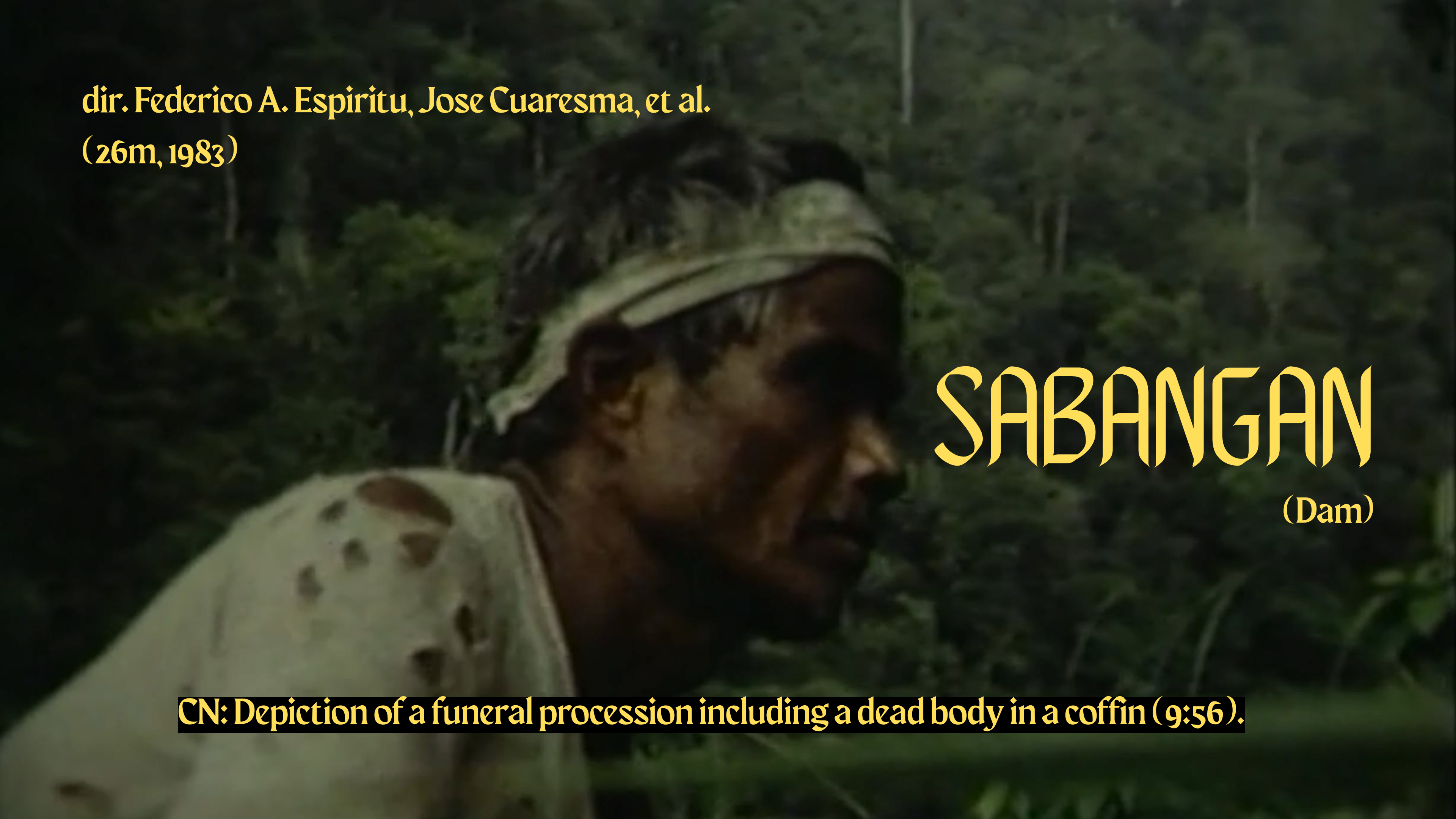
- Aug 2022 Woggle corporation applied for exploration permit
- Feb 2024 Formal certification issued to Woggle without the residents' knowledge
- July 2025 Woggle uprooted trees for road widening without a permit
- Aug 2025 Woggle granted exploration permit for land the size of 4000 football fields in DDN
- Sep 2025 Residents established first barricade to prevent entry of Woggle's mining equipment
- Oct 2025 Woggle filed court injunction; police presence and drone surveillance reported
- Dec 2025 Residents reported attacks, harassment, theft, destruction of property by Woggle personnel

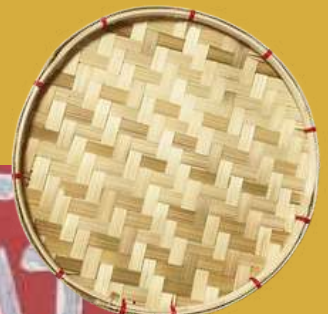

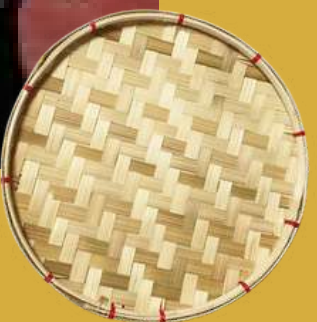


These banners are commonly used during protests in the Philippines, as bilaos are widely available.

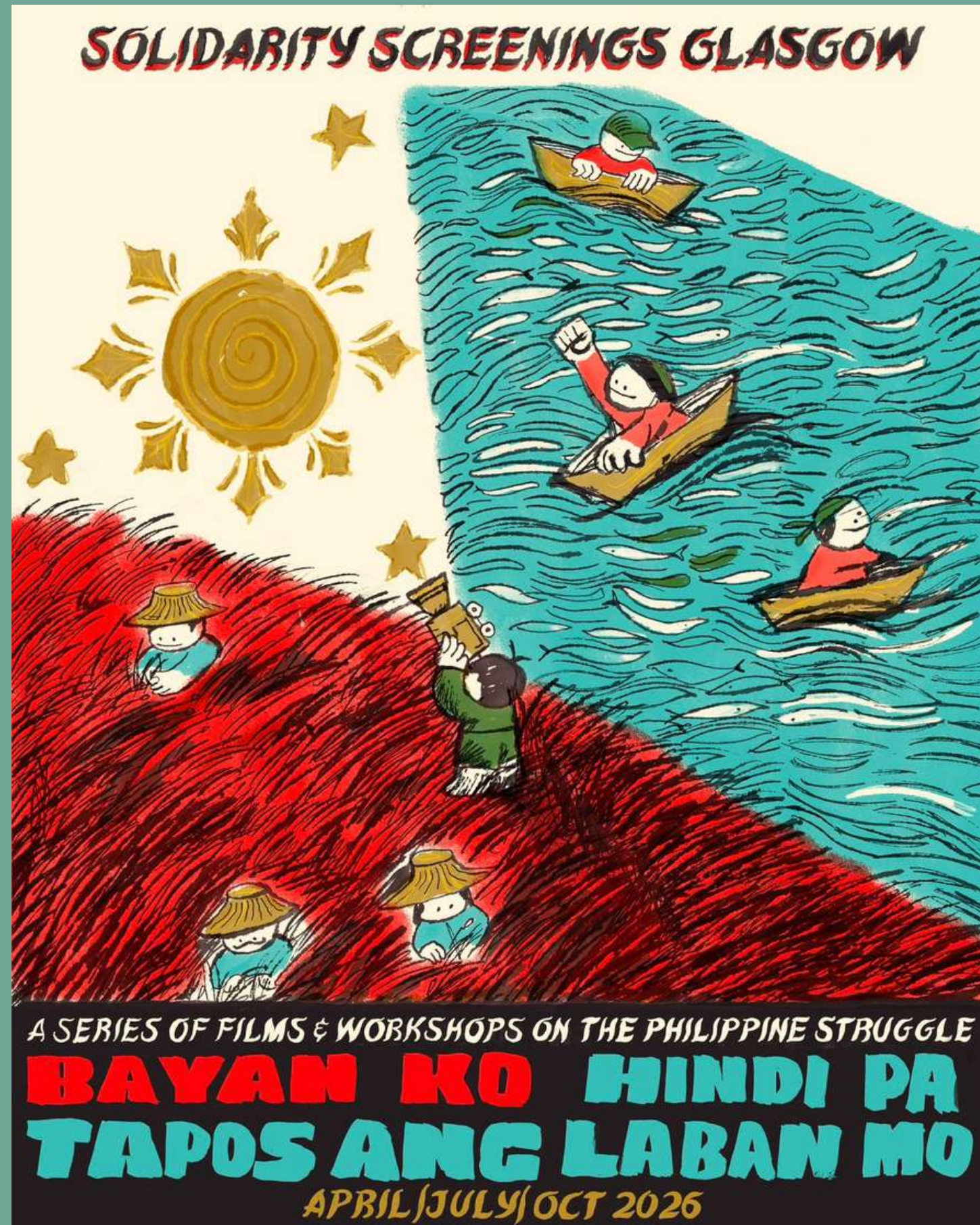
